ABOUT

Alice Lake Provincial Park is located approximately 13km north of Squamish. Alice Lake contains four lakes (Alice, Stump, Fawn, Edith) surrounded by towering mountains, dense forests, and grassy meadows.

The park features a wide variety of recreational opportunities for the avid adventurer or family outing. Swimming in Alice Lake, hiking along one of the many trails (offering excellent views of the Tantalus Range) and mountain biking on some of the best trails in the region are some of the more popular activities.

The park contains camping facilities for tents and RV's, sites equipped with electrical hookups, group campsites, day use picnic sites, swimming, pit toilets/restrooms, shower facilities, water, fishing and hiking and mountain biking on an extensively developed trail system.

FACILITIES AND SERVICES

Firewood and ice are available for purchase from a Park Attendant at the Gatehouse.

Washroom facilities are located near site 47, across from site 77, and in the day use area. Pit toilets (out houses) are available throughout the park.

There is a day use area with picnic tables and parking area located on the north side of Alice Lake. There are barbeque attachments on the picnic tables; bring your own barbeque and briquettes.

- There are two shower buildings available for our reservation holders in the washroom facilities near site 47 and 77. Both shower facilities provide hot water and electrical outlets for hair dryers, razors, etc.

- Drinking water is available throughout the park.
- A sani-station is available in the park. The sanistation is located across from the campground Gatehouse. Access codes can be purchased from Gatehouse.
- The Alice Lake General Store is located in the day use area and sells basic camping necessities, snacks, refreshments and personal hygiene products.



A children's playground is located on the north side of Alice Lake beside the amphitheater.

THINGS TO DO

Canoeing, Kayaking, and Standup Paddleboarding Paddle Sport rentals are offered by Sea to Sky Parks. The rental kiosk is located on the East side of the day use area. Payments for these activities can be made through the Alice Lake General Store.

Biking Alice Lake has a bike trail dedicated to beginner riders and children near the playground. Biking is permitted on all the roadways and trails within the park. The section of Four Lakes Trail between Edith Lake and Alice Lake is permanently closed to cycling. The remainder of Four Lakes Trail is closed to cycling between May 1 and September 15.

Hiking There are 10 trails in this park: the Four Lakes Trail, Mike's Loop, Stump Lake Loop Trail, Alice Lake Loop Trail, Swamp Lantern Interpretive Loop Trail, Bob MacIntosh Memorial Trail, Jacks Trail, DeBeck's Hill Trail, Tracks from Hell Trail and trails to the Lower Alice Ridge. The last five trails head out of the park. For your own safety and preservation of the park, obey posted signs and keep to designated trails.

Four Lakes Trail is 6km in length. You can access the trail from the Stump Lake parking lot and the Alice Lake south beach area. The trail takes you through Douglas fir, western red cedar and other coniferous and deciduous trees. Some of the birds that can be seen are warblers, Steller's jay, chickadees and robins. Small animals such as raccoons, squirrels and chipmunks inhabit the forest and are more apt to be seen by visitors. A few box turtles have been spotted sunning themselves on logs at Alice Lake and Stump Lake.

ENJOY YOUR STAY

Park regulations protect the natural state of the park and ensure a quality experience for all visitors.

- Fires are permitted in designated fire rings only. Visitors may bring firewood or purchase from a Park Attendant.
- Pets must be on a leash at all times. Please be responsible for their behaviour and waste. Please be advised that dogs are not allowed on the Alice Lake Trail, the beach, picnic areas and in playgrounds.
- Anything with an odour could attract wildlife to your site. Place garbage in bins, avoid cooking inside tents and tent trailers, and store all food supplies, including coolers, in your vehicle.


